ABOUT THE TEAM

Betsy Stanko and Amanda Smith have both led public sector initiatives to build trust and engagement with citizens through taking an open approach to data and government services. Enrique Cadenas has experience operating as a lawyer and informing policy in both Argentina and the UK.



BETSY STANKO OBE

Professor Betsy Stanko OBE recently retired (April 2016) as Head, Evidence and Insight, Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime in London. She is currently Chair of the Ministry of Justice's Data, Evidence, and Science Board and Strategic Advisor to a Home Office Police Transformation Fund project focused to uplift learning and development in policing across England and Wales. For over a decade and a half, she worked inside the Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime and the London Metropolitan Police Service's Corporate Development, establishing a social research function alongside performance analysis for improving crime and justice in London. In her first life, she was a professor of criminology, teaching and researching at Clark University (USA), Brunel University, Cambridge University and Royal Holloway, University of London (where she is an Emeritus Professor of Criminology). She is a Visiting Professor both at UCL's Department of Crime Science and Security and City University London's Sociology Department, and a fellow of the Royal Society of the Arts.

Professor Stanko has been awarded a number of academic lifetime achievement awards, including the prestigious American Society of Criminology's Vollmer Award (1996), recognising her outstanding influence on criminal justice practice. From 1997-2002 she was the Director of the ESRC Violence Research Programme. In 2002, she joined government from academia, first in the Cabinet Office Prime Minister's Office of Public Services Reform. She was awarded an OBE in 2014 for her services to policing. In 2018 she was awarded an honorary doctorate from Sheffield Hallam University.



AMANDA SMITH

Amanda Smith is acting Deputy Director of the UK Ministry of Justice's Data Driven Department and Culture Change, where she leads on data strategy, leadership, innovation and culture. Her background is in open data and innovation, digital transformation, leadership, organisation and culture change. Amanda is driven by taking a people focused approach to using data and technology to solve problems.

She started her career in policing, leading the development of the open crime and justice initiative, police.uk and data.police.uk. Her time in the Home Office as a Senior Policy Advisor focused on initiatives to improve police transparency, accountability and engagement. Amanda spent four years at the Open Data Institute as their Senior Consultant, working with corporates and governments across the world. She's trained public sector leaders from 30+ countries, and led data programmes with CapGemini, Deutsche Bank, the European Commission, Met Office, NESTA, Syngenta and Sport England.

Amanda was the winner of the first Bloomberg WISE Open Technology award from HRH Princess Royal for her contributions in data and technology across Europe. She was also recently announced as being in the top 20 of Apolitical's 100 Future Leaders: The world's most influential young people in Government.



ENRIQUE CADENAS

Enrique Cadenas is Head of Social Impact & Innovation at the UK Ministry of Justice's Data Driven Department & Culture Change Team where he leads on social impact investment & innovation and the creation of a "What Works" centre for Crime and Justice. Enrique is driven by identifying innovative projects & best practice in the justice space and establishing partnerships with private and third sector organizations so that these projects can be scaled up and deliver better outcomes.

Enrique started his career as a lawyer in his native Argentina. He has experience working as a practicing lawyer both in Argentina where he worked for a top tier law firm and a multinational corporation, and also in the UK where he advised an investment advisory/ asset management firm in a €2.3bn piece of litigation with proceedings in the UK, Spain & the Netherlands. He was also assistant professor of law and executive director of the undergraduate law programme at Austral University. Enrique received a Chevening Scholarship by the British Foreign Office which allowed him to pursue a Masters of Science in Public Policy & Administration with a concentration in Public Management at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) where he focused his research in the use of behavioural economics to inform policy and regulation.
